REPORT OF FISHERIES PROJECT

A project was undertaken by the 6th semester students of B.Com 2016-2019 batch in the subject Entrepreneurship Development with title "Feasibility of Fisheries in Ri-Bhoi and East Khasi Hills District. Ri-Bhoi district has been chosen as the area of study to know the feasibility in fish production and East Khasi Hills district has been chosen as the area of study to know about the marketing feasibility of fisheries. One hatchery, seven production farms and sixteen market locations have been studied by two hundred and five students in twenty four groups. The students collected information from the owners at the production site as well as marketing site with the help of a questionnaire. The period of study was from 13th of February to 31st of March 2019.



Fisheries has huge potential in Meghalaya, the need of the hour is educating the youth about the potentiality and also government reaching out in providing facilities and scope to the youth. The college undertook this field work for the students of the final semester so as to educate them about fisheries potentiality in the state and also to encourage them to take up entrepreneurship in fisheries as a fish farmer or as a fish vendor.

A REPORT ON THE CAREER COACHING PROGRAMME REPORT

Career Coaching Programme is one of the initiative started by the Shillong Commerce College in the Month of November ,2018 , for its own Alumni and the 6th semester students ,the Coaching Programme is for the preparation of IBPS,MPSC ,SBI Clerical and other Competitive exam . The First Batch of the course started on 19th November, 2018 and ended on 26th April, 2019.

The Coaching Programme course covered the syllabus which contains the following topics and each topics were individually given due hours for its completion-

1. English: sub-topics – Synonyms, Antonyms, Spotting Errors, Correcting Errors, Idioms and Phrases, Use of appropriate and suitable words (These topics were allotted 15 hours per course).
2. General Awareness : sub-topics – Indian History , Indian Constitution , Five Year Plan, General Geography , current events of National and International Importance (These topics were allotted 14 hours per course).

Quantitative Aptitude : sub-topics – Simple Arithmetical Operation, Arithmetic fundamentals , ratio and Proportion , Partnership, Percentage , Profit and Loss , Interest , Average , Area, Simplification , HCF & LCM , Time and Distance , Data Sufficiency , Data Interpretation (These topics were covered within 30 hours per course).

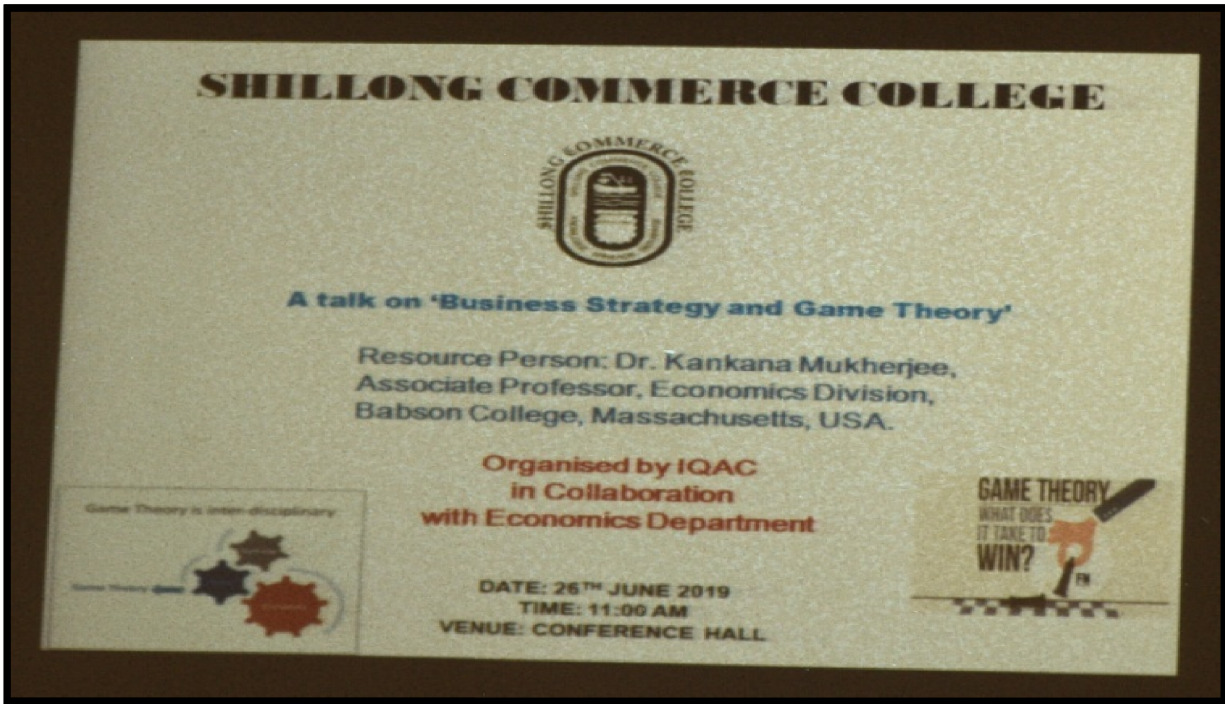
The Resource Person is Dr. Kankana Mukherjee, Associate Professor, Economics Division, Babson College, Massachusetts, USA.

Today's entrepreneurs, managers and leaders are continually being called upon to make strategic decisions, often in new and unfamiliar situations with limited information. Game Theory has emerged as a powerful decision support tool for businesses, helping them formulate winning strategies based on measurable outcomes. Successful business strategy requires managers to not only 'play' a given business game well to gain competitive advantage, but 'shape' the business game so that the company can capture more value. The framework of 'Co-opetition' (Brandenburg and Nalebuff) provides a comprehensive view the overall business game with all the relevant 'players' and the relationships between them. This framework can be used to gain valuable intuition and insights into the rising trends in today's innovative business models.

For any business, we need strategy- which be Corporate strategy or Business strategy. Business is war and peace which means it is a win-loss game. Game of business is creating value through co-operation and capturing value through competition. Combining 'co-operation' and 'competition', we get 'co-opetition'.

A TALK ON“REMEMBERING THOMAS JONES”

On Friday the 21st of June, 2019, Shillong Commerce College observed ‘Thomas Jones’ Day’ and commemorated his arrival to the Khasi hills by having a talk on “*Remembering Thomas Jones*”. The Welcome Address was delivered by Mr Joshua B. Massar, Principal, Shillong Commerce College. The talk was delivered by the former UPSC Chairperson, Prof David R. Syiemlieh, who located the gravesite of Thomas Jones in January 1986 at the Scottish Cemetery at Karaya Road in Kolkata. Prof Syiemlieh talked about the short and significant life of Thomas Jones and his invaluable contribution especially to the Khasi language and literature. Before Jones’ arrival, Sohra and the region around had heard the teachings of the Christian faith by the English Baptist missionary Alexander Lish. Before Lish, the LMS missionary Jacob Tomlin spent months in Sohra in 1827. Thomas Jones was not destined to go to Africa where the London Mission Society (LMS) wanted to send him. In January 1840 the Welsh Presbyterians broke off from the LMS and set up their own mission society. Thomas Jones came out east as their first missionary. Jones came to India as a missionary and arrived at Sohra on June 22, 1841 and set up a mission at Nongsawlia. A year after, he opened the first three schools in Sohra, Mawmluh and Mawsmi. In the same year, he prepared the first Khasi Primer in the Roman script and this was the beginning of the use of Khasi language as a medium of instruction and the very first beginning of Khasi Literature for the Khasi schools. Jones, today, is esteemed as the Father of Khasi Literature. The success of the decision to use the Roman script was in time to become the vehicle by which other mission societies reduced to writing the languages of the numerous other tribes in the North East. In this sense therefore Jones’ impact goes far beyond the Khasi hills. Jones translated the Lord’s Prayer into Khasi; translated the Welsh Catechism, published *Ka Kitab Nongialamand* worked on the translation of the *Gospel of Matthew*, which was published in 1846. Thomas Jones worked in Sohra for eighteen months before other missionaries arrived. Jones had the distinction of never having converted anyone but the church he founded was set on his foundations. He was more interested in improving the economic lot of the people. Jones died in the Bengal capital of Calcutta in September 16, 1849. Apart from delivering a speech on Thomas Jones, Prof. Syiemlieh also spoke about other missionaries who also contributed to the Khasi Language and Literature like William Pryce who published *An Introduction to the Khasi Language* in 1855; William Williams who started *U NongkitKhubor*, a Khasi monthly in 1889; ten years later published the complete *Khasi Bible*; John Hugh Roberts who laboured to produce the *English-Khasi Dictionary* of 1870 and enriched Khasi literature with his work on proverbs, fables, and oral verses – phawars.

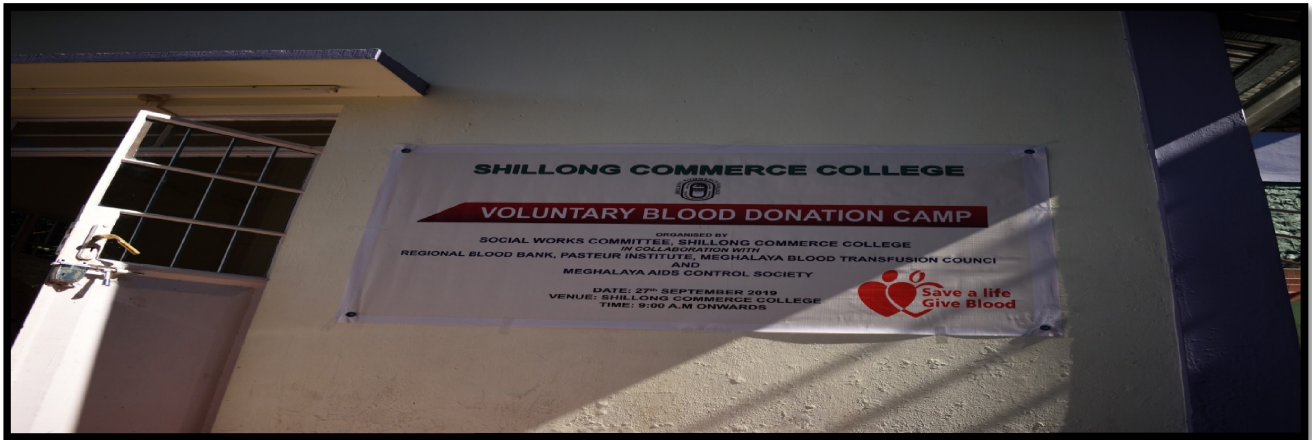

The Awareness talk is a measure of timely intervention to dissuade young people (students) from the clutches of drugs and promiscuous life style. There was a detail presentation on safe and healthy voluntary blood donation.

Welcoming all those present on the occasion, the Principal of the college, Prof. J. B. Massar opined that the greatest gift that can be given is donating blood voluntarily without expecting anything in return.

The programme started at 10.30 am with a welcome speech from the Chairperson of the said programme, Prof. J.C.Blah, HOD, Dept. of Economics.

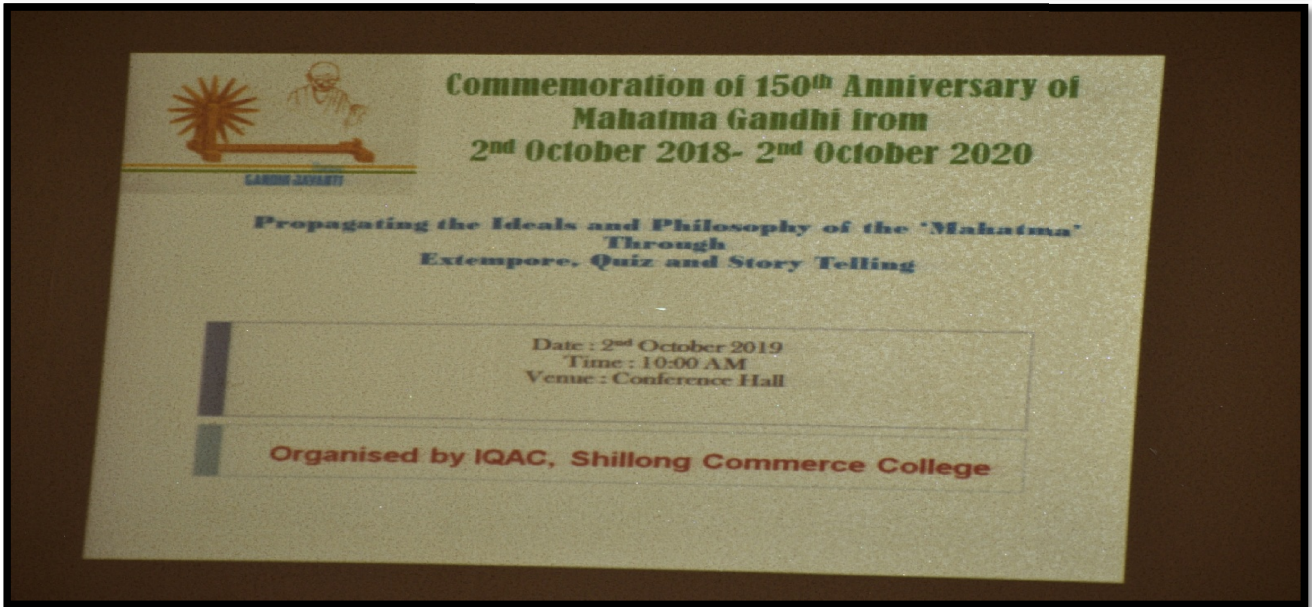

Inter State College Debate :

The Debate Competition began with the felicitation of the guests by the students of the College, followed by a warm welcome speech which was extended by Prof. S. Khongwir, member of the Debate Committee of S.C.C. to the Chief Guest Mr. Torist Mark, Director of Public Instruction Govt. of Meghalaya, and to the Jury and to the Speaker of Debate, Principal, Faculty, Guests teachers and students of the participating institutions.

Prof. J.B. Massar, the Principal of the College shared a brief but interesting history of Rev. J.J.M. Nichols Roy with the audience and stressed on the contribution of Late Reverend to the political history of the State of Meghalaya. Rev J.J.M. introduced a conciliar autonomous Council that paved the way for the general public to contest the election and would become rulers of the people. Rev. Nichols Roy did not intend to abolish the traditional system completely but sought to democratize it by opening up ways for political freedom, equality and eligibility of women too in addition to the general public at the behest of peoples' election or decision.

WORKSHOP ON SEX/HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN THE STATE

6th December 2019

REPORT: SESSION I

Time - 9:30 a.m to 11:00 a.m

Chairperson - Associate Professor S Khongwir

Resource Person - Mr. M Kharkrang, IPS, Assistant IGP (R)

Topic - The Role of Police Machinery with regard to the twin problem of Drugs and Human Trafficking in Meghalaya.

The first session of the workshop on the topic 'The Role of Police Machinery with regard to the twin problem of Drugs and Human Trafficking in Meghalaya' was chaired by Associate Professor MsSonitaKhongwir. The session starts with the felicitation of the Resource Person, Mr M Kharkrang IPS, Assistant IGP (R) followed with a keynote address by the principal Sir J B Massar in which the importance of having the workshop to spread awareness of the inhumane act of sex and human trafficking and its prevention was stressed on.

Following the keynote address, the session was taken over by the Resource Person who talked about the menace of drug abuse in the state of Meghalaya. Citing factual data, the extent of drug use in Meghalaya has been shown to be at an alarming level. For example, in the case of the use of opioids, Meghalaya stands at 2% of drug use among the population with the overall India figure at 0.70%. Considering the population of Meghalaya it has been noted that the given data speaks volumes of the extent of drug use in the state. Also, while the drug usage amounts to 360 MT, the amount seized is only 1.2 MT according to the Drug Survey 2019, this shows that there is a lot of free following drugs into the state. With India located in the middle of the drug producing areas, the North Eastern Region is placed at a vulnerable position as a transit area of illegal drugs. Due to the seriousness of the crime, separate laws have been implemented (NDPS Act 1985).

The resource person further spreads awareness among the participants about the types and varieties of drugs available in the state, drug peddling and drug ingestion in order to serve as a precaution against such vices. Addressing the student participants, further talks on the reasons and effects of drug abuse was taken up with a plea to the students not to resort to drug use in case of reasons such as academic failure or other personal reasons. Prevention tips were also shared so as to not indulge in the same. In addition to the discussions above, the resource person also shared the procedures involved in drug seizures and encouraged the participants to cooperate with the officials in such cases.

A discussion followed the presentation, with questions related to doubts and the resource person further spoke about the use of the internet, and warns about the ill usage of it.

REPORT: SESSION II

Time - 11:30 a.m to 12:45 p.m

Chairperson - Assistant Professor Mr. A M Rynjah

Resource Person - MsNakilinShylla (Advocate)

Topic - Trafficking in the state of Meghalaya, Laws and Remedies with regard to Human Trafficking

The second session of the workshop on the topic 'Trafficking in the state of Meghalaya, Laws and Remedies with regard to Human Trafficking' was chaired by Assistant Professor Mr. A. M. Rynjah. The session started off with the felicitation of the Resource Person, MsNakilinShylla (Advocate and member of Meghalaya State Commission for Women). The resource person firstly discussed about Fundamental Rights and the co-existent Fundamental Duties. Following this, the talk further proceeded to a discussion on rights and the prevailing act of human trafficking which denies a person of his or her rights. Human trafficking has been said to comprise varied forms such as commercial sex work, bonded labour, slavery and organ trade. Due to easy money, human trafficking is taken up as a profession by many in which the target groups mainly consist of women and children, although men are also targeted mostly for bonded labour or as a supply source in the organ trade market.

The resource person further enhances the legal knowledge of the participants on the existing acts implemented against human trafficking while also adding that while laws exist, they were implemented a long time back and in dire need of amendments. While the Immoral Traffic Prevention Act 1956 proclaims prostitution illegal in India, it however has not reduced instances of human trafficking especially among women and children. It was also noted that voluntary prostitution does not come under the act of human trafficking. Among the cases found in Meghalaya, voluntary prostitution was taken up due to want of certain material things and wealth. However it has been found that voluntary sex workers face confinement and overburden of customers which makes them return as victims of human trafficking thereby misusing the law.

The resource person further adds that there is a failure of implementation of the existing laws against human trafficking. Also, when it comes to tracing the victims of human trafficking, the link is such that it is difficult to trace the location of the victims and the people involved in the crime. Citing an example of a mother pushing her daughter into the prostitution, it was stated that it is also on one part the failure of the society as well in curbing the menace.

Speaking on the Bonded Labour System Abolition Act 1976, further discussions were made on the factors causing bonded labour which affect the landless farmers on a large scale. The lack of awareness of one's rights has been cited as one of the main factors contributing to human trafficking in the form of bonded labour. The use of women and children as cheap labour is rampant in the state.

The resource person adds that human trafficking has been on the rise due to the rising demand for the same. It is important that the society fights against this crime in unison.

A discussion followed the presentation with questions from the audience, and the resource person ends the presentation with an advice to not be lured easily by false promises that would lead to dangerous situations.

REPORT: SESSION III

Time - 1:30 P.m to 2:45 p.m

Chairperson - Associate Professor Mr. D Sawkmie

Resource Person - MsSamandaPhanwar, Project Manager, Lamjingshai Project, Manbha Foundation.

Topic - Factors leading to Sex/Human Trafficking, The way to address the problem.

The third session of the workshop on the topic 'Factors leading to Sex/Human Trafficking, The way to address the problem' was chaired by Associate Professor Mr. D Sawkmie. The session started off with the felicitation of the Resource Person, MsSamandaPhanwar, Project Manager, Lamjingshai Project (2010), Manbha Foundation.

The resource person starts off the discussion by stating that human trafficking is the third largest organised crime after drugs and arms trade. Student participants were advised to be wary of lucrative job openings or offerings as victims of human trafficking are usually lured by such false promises. While the purpose of human trafficking is varied such as bonded labour, forced marriages, organ trade and so on, eighty percent (80%) however of such cases is for the purpose of sexual exploitation, India being the hub of this crime in Asia. Reported missing cases are however very less and usually go unreported especially in Meghalaya due to the fear of losing honour in society. Even if found or returned, there have been cases where the society itself refuses to provide relief to the victims due to suspicion of misconduct. Such victims suffer from traumatic physical and mental disorders due to the same. The discrimination of sex workers is rampant in Meghalaya. The reasons behind such actions are not taken into consideration to understand the victim and his or her situation. The society also chooses to not be involved in domestic disputes or abuse thereby giving up chances and opportunities to help such victims. The resource persons further urges the audience to be careful before sharing any improper content on social media.

The closing speech was by the Vice Principal (SFC) Asst. Prof. J.C. Blah, where she spoke about the effects of human trafficking as "modern day slavery" as it robs the victims of basic Human Rights. In most instances people are tricked into such activities. Even with the inhumane nature of how such victims are treated, it is still a multi-billion dollar industry because the risk

factors are very low for the beneficiaries but leaves the victim helpless. She ends her speech with a pledge to help control and remove this evil from society.



WORKSHOP OF FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION AND SPEECH WITH REFERENCE TO SOCIAL MEDIA

Organized by Human Rights Cell

Date 7th December 2019

Speaker: Mr. Shishir Tiwari.

Chairperson: Asso. Prof. Ms. A. Kharmawphlang

The session started with an interaction between the speaker through which certain elementary ideas relating to the topic are brought into focus. Tools of communication can be generally divided into the traditional forms (TV, radio, mobile and print media) and social media primarily driven by the existence of the internet. The latter is pertinent to the discussion at hand. Social media provides an avenue for receiving and creation of information which in turn paves the way for activities like social networking, micro blogging, and video sharing with the public.

Freedom of speech and expression is a human right and it is also vital for the existence of a vibrant and functioning democracy. Mr. Tiwari specifically draws our attention to Article 19 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights within the U.N. charter of 1948. The article states:

Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.

In relation to the above point, attention was focused on article 19 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights:

Everyone shall have the right to freedom of expression; this right shall include freedom to seek, receive and impart information and ideas of all kinds, regardless of frontiers, either orally, in writing or in print, in the form of art, or through any other media of his choice.

India is also a party to this Covenant and article 19 (a) of the constitution states that there will be freedom of speech and expression. This is one of our fundamental rights as citizens of this country.

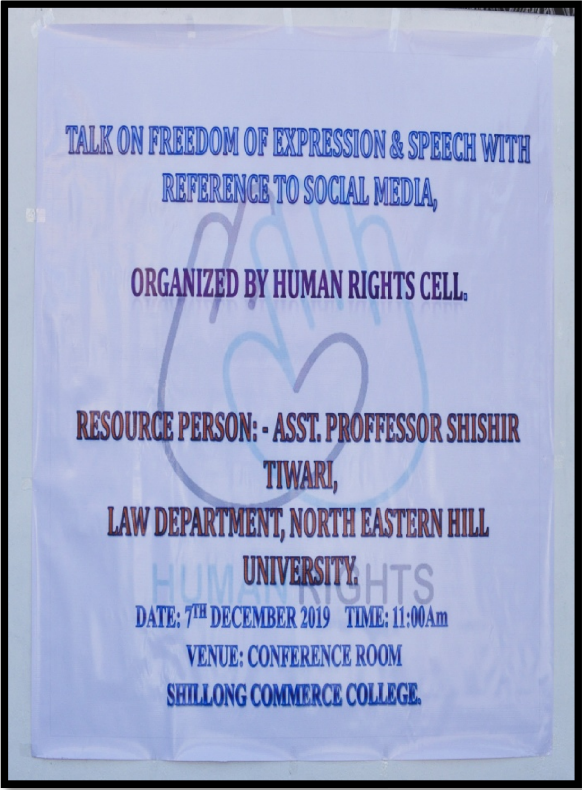
Hence, usage of social media can be viewed as exercising this fundamental right and that one can go to the courts to seek justice in case of any violation.

Social media itself is vital to the protection of other human rights:

1. Right to information
2. Right to education

Social media also allows one to be aware of where and when any other rights are being violated.

Social media can also be misused as in the cases of the 2013 UP riots where circulation of fake news played a part. There is the 2012 case of violence against northeasterners in Bangalore caused by the circulation of rumors that Muslims are being killed in Assam. Hence, a technology of freedom can be turned into a technology of oppression. In order to cease and prevent further misuse of information of technology the Information Technology Act of 2000 was passed. Under this act certain activities are considered illegal and punishable like hacking, publishing obscene information in electronic form be it through whatsapp or facebook messenger, and publication for fraudulent purpose like duping people for financial gains.

WORKSHOP ON SEX/HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN THE STATE

REPORT: SESSION I

Time – 9:30 a.m to 11:00 a.m

Chairperson – Associate Professor S Khongwir

Resource Person – Mr. M Kharkrang, IPS, Assistant IGP (R)

Topic – The Role of Police Machinery with regard to the twin problem of Drugs and Human Trafficking in Meghalaya.

The first session of the workshop on the topic 'The Role of Police Machinery with regard to the twin problem of Drugs and Human Trafficking in Meghalaya' was chaired by Associate Professor Ms Sonita Khongwir. The session starts with the felicitation of the Resource Person, Mr M Kharkrang IPS, Assistant IGP (R) followed with a keynote address by the principal Sir J B Massar in which the importance of having the workshop to spread awareness of the inhumane act of sex and human trafficking and its prevention was stressed on.

Following the keynote address, the session was taken over by the Resource Person who talked about the menace of drug abuse in the state of Meghalaya. Citing factual data, the extent of drug use in Meghalaya has been shown to be at an alarming level. For example, in the case of the use of opioids, Meghalaya stands at 2% of drug use among the population with the overall India figure at 0.70%. Considering the population of Meghalaya it has been noted that the given data speaks volumes of the extent of drug use in the state. Also, while the drug usage amounts to 360 MT, the amount seized is only 1.2 MT according to the Drug Survey 2019, this shows that there is a lot of free following drugs into the state. With India located in the middle of the drug producing areas, the North Eastern Region is placed at a vulnerable position as a transit area of illegal drugs. Due to the seriousness of the crime, separate laws have been implemented (NDPS Act 1985).

The resource person further spreads awareness among the participants about the types and varieties of drugs available in the state, drug peddling and drug ingestion in order to serve as a precaution against such vices. Addressing the student participants, further talks on the reasons and effects of drug abuse was taken up with a plea to the students not to resort to drug use in case of reasons such as academic failure or other personal reasons. Prevention tips were also shared so as to not indulge in the same. In addition to the discussions above, the resource person also shared the procedures involved in drug seizures and encouraged the participants to cooperate with the officials in such cases.

A discussion followed the presentation, with questions related to doubts and the resource person further spoke about the use of the internet, and warns about the ill usage of it.

REPORT: SESSION II

Time – 11:30 a.m to 12:45 p.m

Chairperson – Assistant Professor Mr. A M Rynjah

Resource Person – Ms Nakilin Shylla (Advocate)

Topic – Trafficking in the state of Meghalaya, Laws and Remedies with regard to Human Trafficking

The second session of the workshop on the topic ‘Trafficking in the state of Meghalaya, Laws and Remedies with regard to Human Trafficking’ was chaired by Assistant Professor Mr. A. M. Rynjah. The session started off with the felicitation of the Resource Person, Ms Nakilin Shylla (Advocate and member of Meghalaya State Commission for Women). The resource person firstly discussed about Fundamental Rights and the co-existent Fundamental Duties. Following this, the talk further proceeded to a discussion on rights and the prevailing act of human trafficking which denies a person of his or her rights. Human trafficking has been said to comprise varied forms such as commercial sex work, bonded labour, slavery and organ trade. Due to easy money, human trafficking is taken up as a profession by many in which the target groups mainly consist of women and children, although men are also targeted mostly for bonded labour or as a supply source in the organ trade market.

The resource person further enhances the legal knowledge of the participants on the existing acts implemented against human trafficking while also adding that while laws exist, they were implemented a long time back and in dire need of amendments. While the Immoral Traffic Prevention Act 1956 proclaims prostitution illegal in India, it however has not reduced instances of human trafficking especially among women and children. It was also noted that voluntary prostitution does not come under the act of human trafficking. Among the cases found in Meghalaya, voluntary prostitution was taken up due to want of certain material things and wealth. However it has been found that voluntary sex workers face confinement and overburden of customers which makes them return as victims of human trafficking thereby misusing the law.

The resource person further adds that there is a failure of implementation of the existing laws against human trafficking. Also, when it comes to tracing the victims of human trafficking, the link is such that it is difficult to trace the location of the victims and the people involved in the crime. Citing an example of a mother pushing her daughter into the prostitution, it was stated that it is also on one part the failure of the society as well in curbing the menace.

Speaking on the Bonded Labour System Abolition Act 1976, further discussions were made on the factors causing bonded labour which affect the landless farmers on a large scale. The lack of awareness of one’s rights has been cited as one of the main factors contributing to human trafficking in the form of bonded labour. The use of women and children as cheap labour is rampant in the state.

The resource person adds that human trafficking has been on the rise due to the rising demand for the same. It is important that the society fights against this crime in unison.

A discussion followed the presentation with questions from the audience, and the resource person ends the presentation with an advice to not be lured easily by false promises that would lead to dangerous situations.

REPORT: SESSION III

Time – 1:30 P.m to 2:45 p.m

Chairperson – Associate Professor Mr. D Sawkmie

Resource Person – Ms Samanda Phanwar, Project Manager, Lamjingshai Project, Manbha Foundation.

Topic – Factors leading to Sex/Human Trafficking, The way to address the problem.

The third session of the workshop on the topic ‘Factors leading to Sex/Human Trafficking, The way to address the problem’ was chaired by Associate Professor Mr. D Sawkmie. The session started off with the felicitation of the Resource Person, Ms Samanda Phanwar, Project Manager, Lamjingshai Project (2010), Manbha Foundation.

The resource person starts off the discussion by stating that human trafficking is the third largest organised crime after drugs and arms trade. Student participants were advised to be wary of lucrative job openings or offerings as victims of human trafficking are usually lured by such false promises. While the purpose of human trafficking is varied such as bonded labour, forced marriages, organ trade and so on, eighty percent (80%) however of such cases is for the purpose of sexual exploitation, India being the hub of this crime in Asia. Reported missing cases are however very less and usually go unreported especially in Meghalaya due to the fear of losing honour in society. Even if found or returned, there have been cases where the society itself refuses to provide relief to the victims due to suspicion of misconduct. Such victims suffer from traumatic physical and mental disorders due to the same. The discrimination of sex workers is rampant in Meghalaya. The reasons behind such actions are not taken into consideration to understand the victim and his or her situation. The society also chooses to not be involved in domestic disputes or abuse thereby giving up chances and opportunities to help such victims. The resource persons further urges the audience to be careful before sharing any improper content on social media.

The closing speech was by the Vice Principal (SFC) Asst. Prof. J.C. Blah, where she spoke about the effects of human trafficking as “modern day slavery” as it robs the victims of basic Human Rights. In most instances people are tricked into such activities. Even with the inhumane nature of how such victims are treated, it is still a multi-billion dollar industry because the risk factors are very low for the beneficiaries but leaves the victim helpless. She ends her speech with a pledge to help control and remove this evil from society.

REPORT ON LEGAL LITERACY CAMPAIGN ON POCSO (AMENDMENT) ACT, 2019

Held on the 6th December 2019

The Meghalaya State Legal Services Authority: Shillong in collaboration with the Women's Cell, Shillong Commerce College organized a ***Legal Literacy Campaign on POCSO (Amendment) Act, 2019***. This is part of the Access to Justice (A2J) (NE& JK), Project Meghalaya. The programme started at 10.00 am with the inauguration and introduction to the programme by A2J Staff members, Shri Albert Sngi Lyngdoh and Shri Batiplang Syiemlieh. Pamphlets were distributed to the audience which comprised teachers and students of the College. Video clips related to POCSO were shown to the gathering with inputs from Shri Albert S. Lyngdoh who stressed on the importance of safety and prevention of abuse to young children. The objective of A2J is to address the legal needs of the marginalized sections of society through the POCSO (Protection of Children from Sexual Offenses) Act which was passed in 2012 and amended in 2019.

In her speech, the Vice Principal and Convener of the Women's Cell, Ms. J.C.Blah asserted that POCSO is a provision to protect children from sexual offenses. Such type of offenses can be attributed to the death of morality. Sexual abuse of a child is a cowardly act and protecting children is everyone's duty.

Dr. (Ms.) Mrinalini Kharshiing, Assistant Professor, Shillong Law College, spoke at length about POCSO, explaining that it seeks to protect children from offenses such as sexual assault, sexual harassment and pornography and that its main objective is to ensure the safety of children in India by making punishment more stringent for committing sexual offenses against children.

The Principal, Shri J.B. Massar, in his speech, expressed grief and concern at what is happening around. In his opinion, perpetrators of such crimes have a sick mind. Rampant and easy access to pornographic materials has aggravated the problem. He is of the belief that no one is to be trusted and caution must be exercised at every step.

The interactive session saw enthusiastic participation from both students and teachers. Dr. Kharshiing answered all questions put forward and the programme ended with a vote of thanks by Dr. Sabita Sen, Vice Principal and with the singing of the National Anthem.

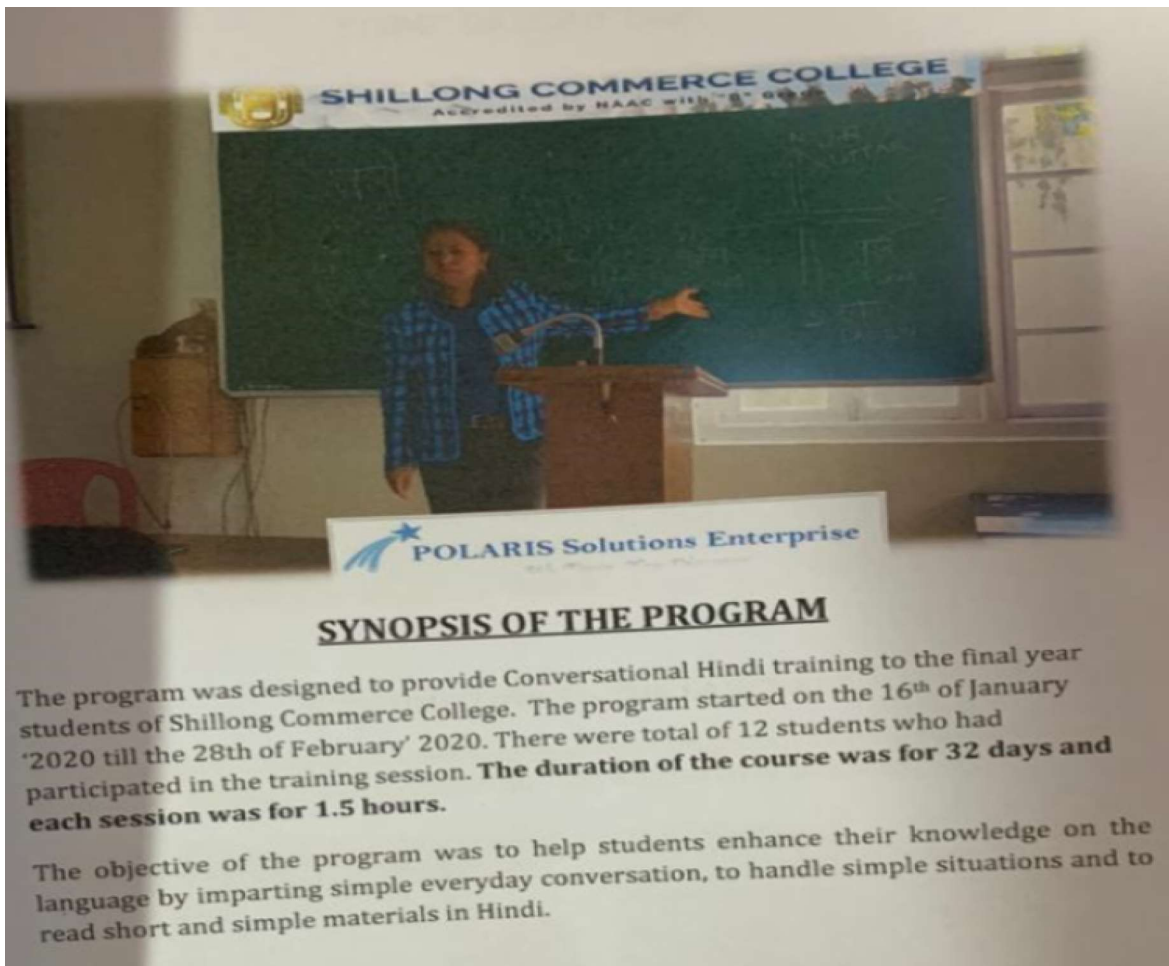
TALLY ERP9 2020 WITH ALMA

Report of Counselling Department for the year 2020

The following is a brief report of the counselling department for the year 2020.

During this year value education classes were taken for BCom 6th Semester both morning and day sections separately on 14th of March 2020 on the topic “Cultivating relationships that last”.

The students actively participated in the classes and discussions that followed. There were also many questions raised on the topic. Through the discussions the counsellor found out that many of the students were having relationship issues and majority of the students were from broken families where the father had left them. Some of them were orphaned having lost both parents and had a hard time adjusting to the relatives they were staying with. The counsellor stressed upon the students on the need to build healthy relationships in the family and among friends. After the presentation the feedback form was distributed to the students. Here they expressed that from the class they had learnt the importance of having a healthy relationships. The counsellor also encouraged the students to come for individual counselling. Few students also came for individual counselling seeking help and guidance in their future career life.

With the onset of the COVID 19 pandemic, the counsellor through online platforms and social media encouraged the students to contact her personally in case of any need for personal counselling especially those who were afraid, depressed, stressed and traumatised by the COVID 19 crisis. The counsellor also through a write up encouraged the students to give their best in their exams urging them to consider this trying time as an opportunity to grow emotionally, socially, spiritually and academically.

During this pandemic the counsellor was able to further sharpen her skills by attending an online internship program for 1 month, in the month of October 2020 conducted by the **Brain Behaviour Research Foundation of India (BBRFI)** a National level leading research Organization registered under the Indian Trust Act 1882 with a mandate to develop new techniques, tools & methods to solve the Mental Health problems.

This internship has immensely helped the counsellor to further understand various aspects of psychological and mental health issues. It has also helped her to further increase her skills as a counsellor.
