

SHILLONG COMMERCE COLLEGE ANNUAL REPORT JULY 2022- JUNE 2023

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PROFILE OF THE COLLEGE

The College was started in June 1964 under the name Commerce College, Shillong, as a purely private college in G. S. Road, Shillong. It was shifted to the present land and building on 1st May 1967. Temporary affiliation was granted by the Guwahati University up to B.Com (Pass Course) in 1967.

The College was closed down by the Governing Body from 1st April 1977 due to mismanagement by the College Authorities, and was de-affiliated by NEHU. The services of the Principal, Teaching Staff and Office Staff were also terminated by the Governing Body.

The management of the college was taken over by the Government of Meghalaya by an Act of 1984 adopted by the Meghalaya Legislative Assembly and duly assented by the President of India on 17th November 1984.

The college was re-opened from 28th May 1986 as Shillong Commerce College, with PU Commerce classes (Class XI and XII) in the same land and building duly improved, renovated and repaired after permission for reopening was granted by NEHU authorities. Initially provisional affiliation was granted for 3 years only by the University for PU Commerce from 11th September 1987. However, the college is affiliated to the North Eastern Hill University for under graduate, B.Com (Hons.) classes. The college is now recognized by the UGC under 2F in January 1989 and under 12B in June 2003.

In the beginning the college started with a full time Principal who came on deputation from the Government of Meghalaya, 7 full time lecturers and 6 full time office staff with a strength of only 120 students for the session 1987-88. Now the college has 25 full time lecturers and 15 office staff with strength of 1150 students: 748 Degree students & 402 Higher Secondary for the session 2015-2016.

In a very short span of time the college has been able to produce students who have done remarkably well in their lives. Yet the college still needs to achieve more in terms of quality education. In this respect it is felt that the process of Assessment and Accreditation is a great opportunity to go beyond our daily routine and get involved in the extremely satisfying process of overhauling and self learning. It is hoped that something good would definitely emerge out of the assessment, which would thus create a better academic climate in the college.

The College has grown in terms of number of faculty members, students, co- curricular and extracurricular programs. We are open to students of all communities. A large proportion of our students are first generation learners in the arena of higher education. We strive tirelessly to upgrade skills and knowledge, impart values and guide our students to take their place as responsible citizens of India.

The College strives to provide holistic education to the students. The Self Study Report is a culmination of our efforts and we look forward to a rewarding interaction with the NAAC Peer Team to accredit our institution.

Vision of Shillong Commerce college is to be an accessible, responsive and inclusive college delivering excellent programmes of teaching and outreach that improve the lives and opportunities of students - primarily for the economically disadvantaged- of the state and the region as a whole.

REPORT ON SOFT SKILLS

"Soft Skills & Life Skills" training aims at helping the student to discover life changing experience, especially during these unprecedented times, so that he/she can become more resilient and have the courage to rise above and soar high in life. The aim is to

There were a total of 162 students who registered for the said training. The session were divided into 2 (two) batches - Morning & Day.

REPORT ON TALLY

SUMMARY REPORT ON TALLY WITH GST TRAINING PROGRAM, 2022 - 2023

The Certificate Course on Tally with GST Training for session 2022 - 2023 commenced on the 23^{rd} of June, 2022 till the 30^{th} of July 2022. Altogether 206 students of 6^{th} Semester B.Com. enrolled for the course. The duration of the course was for 4 weeks (30 days approx.) and each contact session was for 2 hours.

The classes were held in three batches everyday from Monday to Saturday:

- First Batch (66 students) from 7:00 A.M. till 9:00 A.M.
- Second Batch (87 students) from 9:00 A.M. till 11:00 A.M.
- Third Batch (55 students) from 12:30 P.M. till 2:30 P.M.

OBJECTIVE: The main objective of the program was to help students develop competencies and capabilities. To ensure that students equip themselves with the skills they are trained in each activity. Each session is designed in such a way that students are exposed to practical ways of learning.

- Cost Category and Cost Centers: Meaning of Cost Center and Cost Category in Tally ERP9, steps to create cost center, cost category, cost center class, cost class, etc. In Tally ERP9(theory and practical).

- **Price Level:** Meaning of Price Level, Steps required to set up the price level of Retailers, Wholesalers and Dealers, Assignments.
- **Budget:** Meaning of Budget, steps for creating Budget, Problems and Assignments.
- Goods and Services Tax: GST in India, Applicability of GST in Tally ERP9, Students are given problems to practice where they have to apply GST tax rate on Tally.
- **Payroll Reports:** Meaning of Payroll Reports, steps to create Payroll Reports in Tally ERP9, Assignment.
- **Purchase Orders and Sales Orders:** Practical and Theory explanation of how to enable purchase order, sales order and job order in tally ERP9, Problems for practice.
- **Printing:** Cheque printing ,multi accounts printing, purchase printing etc.
- Security Control in Tally: Security features of Tally

ASSESSMENT: After completion of the course an assessment was conducted by the trainer to grade the students individually. The assessment was divided into two verticals **PRACTICAL** and **WRITTEN.**

The written assessment was a set of questions based on the topics that were covered and the Practical assessment was based on the problems which were given during practical classes. Also a set of questions were given as a final project to each student. Each student had to take up both the assessments and grades were allotted based on their performance.

CERTIFICATION DAY: On this day a small function is organised to distribute the certificates to the students. The Principal and the trainer distributed the certificates. Out of 206 students 206 were given certificates.

CONCLUSION: The Training Program was very successful. The students have learned and benefitted a lot from this program. The trainer constantly motivated and advised the students on their potential future careers such as Accounts Executive, Junior Accountant, GST Practitioner, Accounts Assistant and Tally Operator.

SUMMARY REPORT OF THE BASIC SHORT TERM COMPUTER COURSE (22nd August to 31st October 2022)

The classes for the Basic Short Term Computer Course started from the 22nd of August 2022 and concluded on the 31st of October 2022. The total number of students enrolled was 55. The duration of the course was for 44 days and each session was for 1.5 hours.

The classes were taken in two batches from Monday to Friday:

- First Batch (11 students) from 11:45 A.M. to 1:15 P.M.
- Second Batch (44 students) from 3:00 P.M. to 4:30 P.M.

OBJECTIVE: The main objective of the course is to provide basic computer knowledge to the students such as sending emails, conducting internet searches, creating word and excel power point documents. These basic computer skills will help students succeed in college when they are utilised to process and present information.

ASSESSMENT: The students were assessed in the manner of a Practical Exam every alternate week during the duration of the course. In order to further enhance and test their ability, a Viva Voce was conducted at the end of the course.

Out of 55 enrolled students 51 of them completed the course successfully and were awarded certificates on the Certification Day, the 12th of November 2022.

Introduction

Mawrie Garments Manufacturer was initiated on February 1, 2021. It was registered under Micro small-medium enterprises, Meghalaya with the GST Number: 17DZEPM8374M1ZK and empanelled under Meghalaya State Skill Development Society, Government of Meghalaya with the empanelment number:0101011

The vision of the Mawrie Garments Manufacturer is "Developing products indigenously" which means we manufactured products indigenously so as to create employment opportunities and hence we tag our products as "Create with love" as an emblem of identity and pride in our ability to be self-sustain.

In line with this, Mawrie Garments Manufacturer being the only manufacturing unit in Meghalaya, has broaden their work towards the training of youth in knitting, stitching and embroidery as part of creating skilled youth in the various vocational course in particularly in this case, computerized knitting, stitching and embroidery work.

2.1 Goal of the project

The goal of this project: "Providing efficient and skilled youth with new technical innovations"

2.2 Objectives of the project

- 1. To enhance youth with skills in operating the computerized knitting machines.
- 2. To develop skilled youth in the area of embroidery and stitching
- 3. To provide support and suggest measures for improving livelihood.
- 2.3 Component of the project

The Manufacturing unit is offering two courses which will include both theory and practical and they are:

- a. Pattern making
- b. Line stitching
- 2.4 Project implementation

There were six trainers and 50 students who have enrolled in the course. The mobilization for these students was done at the community level through the Headman of the community and also through Shillong Commerce college. There were 80 applicants and 50 were shortlisted for

the course based on their interests, their easy accessibility in terms of transportation, age, and their qualification.

The training started in June 2022 with 50 students and classes was conducted in two batches. The class was conducted for 4 hours for each batch from Monday to Saturday. The module of the class was segregated between theory and practice. The theory classes cover around 100 hours and the practical classes were 300 hours which is as per the National Sector Skills Qualification Pack.

The assessment was conducted on November 5, 2022, through Base Research, New Delhi, a third party. The assessment was conducted through the written form in terms of theoretical knowledge and the practical is conducted through their products produced as well as Viva. Out of 50 students, only 29 students are eligible for the exams as per the attendance policy of the training center and they all cleared their exams. Out of this 72% have attained an A grade and the rest have all attained a B grade.

Conclusion

Out of these students who have completed the course, the Manufacturing Unit was able to enlist two students as employees presently and hoping we will be able to sign up more depending on the need of the unit. However, many of these students have expressed their desire to start up their own and also another few wanted to pursue advanced training in the same Manufacturing Unit.

MILK MARKETING IN SHILLONG AGGLOMERATION

This project aims to determine the objectives of Dairy Farming on how milk production is taken place and what its marketing aspects, also to find that how the firm were able to maintain their business and supply the demand within Shillong agglomeration

METHODOLOGY

The study was conducted in suburbs of Shillong, East Khasi Hills of Meghalaya. To understand the market perspective, primary data was collected from 50 dairy farmers of Meghalaya and the milk disposal pattern and price for milk received by them were collected. Private, government firms, shops were selected randomly from Surburbs of Shillong East Khasi Hills for the study. Fifty dairy farmers were selected randomly from each of the selected areas, taking the total to 50 dairy farmers in a district. Hence, a sample of 50 dairy farmers was selected. Primary data was collected on socio-economic variables and on dairy animals, milk production and disposal pattern through structured interview schedule using survey method and closed end questionnaire for the year2021-22.

To gather the needed information for the study data were collected through the questionnaire from primary survey to different localities all over the Shillong areas such as Madanriting, Happy Valley, MCP Lapalang Rynjah, Nongrah, Pynthorbah, Mawlai Mawkynroh, Mawlai Nonglum, Mawdatbaki, Mawklot, Lummawbah, Lawsohtun, Veterinary Farm, NA RI (Mawiong)etc.








As per the study it could be identified that dairy marketing usually included two levels of distribution namely:

Primary Market: these market are located in villages headquarters or at the cross roads, milk are collected from villages through the registered units which are then processed packed in small packages and distributed through different vendors

,these market are situated at Umlynka, Umseh, Ri-Bhoi, Mawryngkneng.

Secondary Market: it covers wide coverage area usually it is collection points which assembles the milk and brings for the serving of large areas of consumers, it consist of one or more wholesale market in few locally known retailers example "NA RI ESSENTIALS HUB "located at Umsning, mawlai, Sohra, Tynrai Multipurpose Cooperative Society Stores Pynthorbah, jp store, KG departmental store Nongmynsong, NEMCOS Neigrihms, Azad Lyngdoh Departmental Store Laban. And the marketing coverage of milk is at other districts as well.

Although many problems and constraints that may hamper the development of the dairy sector were identified in the study area, the majority of dairy farmers were willing to continue, expand and/or involve in dairying in the future. The rest of the farmers were not willing to expand dairying in the future for various reasons. Smallholder dairy farming is increasingly gaining importance as a source of family income.





IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON STREETS VENDORS IN SHILLONG

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Research Methodology:

This study follows a mixed method of qualitative and quantitative approach. The primary data were collected through the fieldwork. The fieldwork was carried out in Shillong (East Khasi Hills District). The three areas selected were Iewduh (Bara Bazar), Polo and Mawlai. These areas were purposely selected as the majority of street vendors working there can be found to have varying demographic characteristics and socio-economic status. A total of 64 respondents were selected for the study, selecting 21 street vendors from Mawlai, 21 street vendors from Polo and 22 street vendors from Iewduh.

The study adopted the technique of interview and schedule for data collection. The questions (both open-ended and close ended) were formulated in order to collect the requisite data Questions were design to elicit information on the personal profile, work profile, income status of the respondents. Secondary sources that were collected from available books, articles, report and journals have been used as well.

Suggestions and Discussion:

When asked about the suggestions to improve the condition of the street vendors, many street vendors in Shillong suggested that the State Government should provide proper, non-disturbing, safe and secure places for street vendors to conduct their business. It should provide proper place for them to shelter themselves from the heat, cold, rain and storm etc. It should create an awareness from time to time, on how to maintain cleanliness and provide a proper wastage management system.

The findings of this study reveal that street vendors in Shillong are mostly married women from low-income families, uneducated or drop-outs before 10th class. Poverty is one of the reasons for choosing vending as there is no alternative to take up other jobs. Most of the

street vendors are road side vendors and have temporary shelters. These sections of the society were mostly affected during and after the pandemic even though the State Government and some associations are coming forward for aid during the period. The study reveals that the State Government's delayed and inadequate handling out of grants, and the few number of associations available fail to meet the requirement of the street vendors during and after the pandemic. As we get used to the new normal, the Government should take initiative to ensure that all vendors are able to access to social security of different kind and financial aid during period of crises.

It can be pointed out that future studies should be made in order to have a deeper understanding of the hardship which the street vendors are facing especially during crises such as pandemic which can provide a more detailed, practical and feasible policies.

FIELD TRIP AND STUDY TOUR

REPORT ON INDUSTRIAL VISIT TO UMIAM INDUSTRIAL ESTATE

UMIAM, MEGHALAYA.

The Department of Commerce, Shillong Commerce College organised an industrial visit to the Umiam Industrial Area at Umiam, Meghalaya on the 4th of May, 2023. A contingent of 225 students of the B.Com 6th semester along with Prof. B.R. Upadhya (Head of the Department of Commerce), Prof. A. M. Rynjah, Prof. A. Bamon, Prof. A Singhania, Prof. B. D. Nongkhlaw, Prof. K. Agarwal, Prof. M. Sutradhar, Prof. M. Wankhar, Prof. P. Marbaniang, Prof. P. C. Marwein, Prof. P. Kharkyr and Prof. R. Chyne undertook the trip. The journey started at around 9 a.m from the college to the desired destination at Umiam which is approximately 16.8 kms from Shillong. On reaching Umiam, the group met Mr. K. S. Mawlieh of Meghalaya Industrial Development Corporation (MIDC) who was deputed as the Coordinator for the visit.

The purpose of the visit was to give the students a real life exposure to the functioning of industrial units so that they get a better perspective through the observation of the manufacturing processes and industrial operations. The opportunity to visit the three factories *viz.*, Riangdo Venners Pvt. Ltd., M/S Green Flames and M/S Premier Roller Flour Mill has been a great learning experience for the students. Each plant engaged a technical person to guide and facilitate the students' queries. The interactions with the factory's executives and staffs helped them gain important knowledge about the steps and processes involved in the manufacturing of the different products produced in the three factories.

M/S Premier Roller Flour Mill

The Premier Roller Flour Mill specializes in the production of wheat flour for domestic markets. It was established in 1987 and it currently employs 25 numbers of employees. The Mill is run by Mrs Asha Rapsang. During the visit the students were given a brief overview of the company's history and operations. The students were taken on a tour of the production facility where they were able to observe the milling process of wheat grains into flour. The different stages of production process, including cleaning, conditioning, grinding and packaging were showed. The unit provides a wide range of other products such as maida, suji and atta.

The manager showed the different equipments and machinery used in the different stages of the production process including cleaning machines, roller mills and packaging machines. The manager also demonstrated its quality control measures and how it ensures that its products meet the required standard. He explained the marketing and sales strategies, including how it reaches its target market and promotes its products. They also discussed the pricing strategy, distribution channels and the challenges the company faces in a competitive market.

The manager explained that they employed 25 numbers of workers in the form of both skilled and unskilled and they paid Rs 7200 to skilled workers and Rs 5500 to unskilled workers.

The visit to the Premier Roller Mill was a valuable learning experience to the students.

Riangdo Venners Pvt. Ltd

Riangdo Venners Pvt. Ltd is situated in the industrial area in Umiam, Meghalaya. The company is limited by shares, the owner of the company is Ajit Kumar Jana and the directors of the company are Ajit kumar Jana, Tulfan Kanti Jana, Gautam Bora and George Lyndoh. The company was incorporated on 16th December 1993. The company is classified as a private limited company and is registered with Registrar of Companies, Shillong. The authorized share capital is Rs 10,000,000 and its paid up capital is Rs 4,878,550.

The company is mainly involved in the manufacture of plywood, blockwood and flushdoor. The makri sal that is being used for making these products is being imported mainly from Manipur and a very small quantity from Shillong. The finished product is exported to wholesellers and retailers in Meghalaya. On an average around 3000 pieces of plywood are produced per day. The company has taken loan from the State Bank of India and Axis bank Ltd.

The students were taken for a tour of the complete manufacturing process and the company representative showed the manufacturing process from the obtaining of the logs and then exporting the final product. The manufacturing process included:

- Selecting logs and conditioning
- Peeling and clipping
- Drying the veneer
- Composing the sheets
- Bonding using adhesives
- Cold press then hot press
- Quality check
- Sanding and trimming
- Packing, stacking and stamping.

After the finished product is ready they are sold to the various buyers.

M/S Green Flames (Briquettes)

Green Flames unit was established in the year 2021. It is a partnership business consisting of two partners. The name of one of the partner is Varun Agarwal. The representative

of the unit was unable to give the name of the other partner. The total capital of the unit is Rs 1 Crore of which 80% is contributed through a bank loan and the remaining 20% was contributed by the owners.

There are 50 workers employed in the unit of which half of them work on day shift and the remaining half work in night shift. There are two operators in each shift who are classified as skilled worker. The salary ranged between Rs 10,000 to Rs 12,000 per month.

The representative of the unit explained the briquettes production process . The process goes through two stages including the heating process and the compressed process. The first stage is to heat up the sawdust in order to get the product and then the sawdust is compressed by the machine in order to form a briquette which is the finished product. The product is then sold to the units needing biomass energy. The briquettes are mainly sold to Assam.

Biomass briquette plant project is renewable source of energy and can protect environment through recycling biomass residues.

REPORT ON THE FIELD TRIP TO NONGKHLAW

ORGANISED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY ON THE 12TH MAY, 2023

The Department of History organised a field trip to Nongkhlaw on the 12th May 2023 for the 4th and 6th semester honours students. There were a total number of 18 students along with four faculty members, Asst Prof. Dr. L. Pyrngap, Asst Prof. Sophia C. Kurbah, Asst Prof. Sashi T. Laloo and Asst Prof. Marbiangdor Myrthong. The trip to Nongkhlaw and the surrounding areas was important to the students as the place witnessed the Anglo-Khasi War of 1829 led by U Tirot Sing Syiem the Chief of Hima Khadsawphra and other Khasi Chiefs. The consequences of the war resulted in the advent of the colonial rule in the Khasi Hills.

The trip commenced from the college premises at 8.30 am and the first stop enroute to Nongkhlaw was Ka Phan Nonglait falls at Nongrmai village, a waterfall that commemorated the valor of Ka Phan Nonglait a woman who sacrificed her life for the uprising. On reaching Nongkhlaw, we stopped for lunch and then proceeded to Krem Pyrda (Pyrda Cave) and Krem Siej Tyra (Siej Tyra Cave). The different chambers in the caves were used by Tirot Sing and his warriors to conduct secret meetings at the same time sought shelter during the war.

The next destination was U Maw Bishar or the Judgement Stone of Tirot Sing, which was probably the place where the Khasi Durbar was presided as reflected in the account of Major A. White in 1826. We then proceeded towards the remaining part of the David Scott trail – a road project that aimed to connect the British territories of the Brahmaputra Valley (Assam) and the Surma Valley (Sylhet) in the 1830s. In many ways, the construction of this road and the confiscation of the Khasi lands in the Brahmaputra valley brought so much suspicion and insecurities to the people that eventually led to the commencement of the war in 1829.

We left Nongkhlaw at 2.40 pm and halted for a tea break at Mairang, then reached Shillong in the evening at 6pm. The fieldtrip was important for the students of the 6th Semester as Unit I of their Paper 8 (North-East India, 1824-1972) revolves around these historical events. As for the 4th semester students, their Paper 4, Unit IV (Historiography), topics like Social History and Subaltern History was implied with the Anglo-Khasi War.





REPORT ON STUDY TOUR- DEPARTMENT OF KHASI

Meghalaya is laden with natural beauty; therefore, a lot of the tourists from outside come and visit our state to spend their holidays. Meghalaya consist of places like Sohra (also known as Cherrapunjee) and Mawsynram which receives the highest rainfall in the world, such places attract many tourist to visit the state each year. Other than housing the wettest place on earth, Meghalaya also has many natural attractions that draw in tourists not only from other states in India but from other countries as well. Some of these tourist spots are mingled with the local myths and stories of the Khasi as well as the traditional beliefs of the Khasi community like Nohkalikai falls, Daiñthlen falls, Khoh Ramhah, etc.

Hence, the Khasi Department of Shillong Commerce College has decided to visit one of these places as the educational field trip for the students, as it will enhance the students' knowledge on Khasi literature, culture and traditions.

On the 19th of May, 2023, the Department had organized a study tour for the students of the 6th semester to visit Daiñthlen falls and Prut falls. The tour consists of thirteen students and five teachers.

The students have benefitted a lot from this study tour in which they got indepth knowledge about the history of 'U Thlen' (a giant serpent). The myth follows the story of how the Khasi people defeated and killed U Thlen, which is a man eating serpent. The fall is named after this myth because on top of Daiñthlen falls there is an imprint on a rock of a tail-like image believed to belong to 'U Thlen'. Although now, it is believed that the image was actually carved by Khasi ancestors. This shows that the Khasi people knew how to smelt iron from time immemorial.

Khasi myths like the myth of 'U Thlen' that links it to the Daiñthlen falls, helps in associating the Khasi oral tradition with the natural world. This also enriches the Khasi culture and helps in promoting tourism in the state.

The Khasi Department plans to organize more study tours in the coming future to help students have a greater appreciation for the literature they learn in class and allows for a holistic learning experience.




Conclusion



A prayer for the institution was offered by Sir Kitbok Nongkynrih. An introductory speech was given by Ms. Angelous Lytan. A short speech was given by the Principal of Ferrando Speech and Hearing Centre, Sr. Arda Mary Ryntathiang.

Presentation 1:

The first presentation was given by Prof. Lakshmi Arya Thathachar.

The presentation was divided into three parts.

The first part of the discussion was on the key highlights of the NEP, 2020 which are as follows:

- 1. Mltidiciplinarity- there should be a large number of universities offering courses in many disciplines rather than a single stream educational institution in order to make education more holistic.
- 2. Research- the culture of research should be encouraged in Higher Educational Institutions.
- 3. Internationalisation of Education- India should become a global study destination. High performing Indian universities should be encouraged to set up campuses in other countries.
- 4. Gross enrollment in higher education should be increased from the present 26.3 per cent to 50 per cent in 2035. The main focus should be on access, equity and inclusion.

The second part was on Liberal arts and Liberal Education Paradigm in India. The liberal arts paradigm is focused on:

- 1. Development of cognitive skills such as critical thinking, writing, reading, etc.
- 2. Inter- disciplinarity and multi-disciplinarity, and
- 3. Experiential learning

The third part was on the policy emphasis on Indigineism. Education should be made:

- 1. More culturally relevant, and
- 2. More India focused

Presentation 2:

The second presentation was made by Prof. Meera Baindur. The presentation was a philosophical reflection on the idea of the New Education Policy where the issue of pedagogy and anxiety was addressed.

Critique: the NEP has so much of demand of pedagogy. Education has to be experiential, holistic, integrated, inquiry driven, discovery oriented, learner centered, discussion based, flexible and enjoyable. Therefore it is a challenge to address all of the above in the classroom and this leads to anxiety among the teachers.

The anxieties that teachers may have due to the NEP implementation are power anxiety, anxiety of losing control of the classroom and of losing content superiority. This changes the dynamics and the teacher becomes more of a service provider than a pedagogue.

The speaker gave some remarks on the fundamental principles with a positive outlook on the design of the NEP:

- 1. The present system of education is content based and class based learning. There is a relationship between time and learning. How do we implement pace based learning in a general way to take care of the fast-paced and slow-paced learners. How do we integrate the new learner- centric system of education in this kind of an environment?
- 2. The biggest problem in implementing (*inaudible*) is the time period. A particular course has certain requirements and has to be completed within a certain number of classes but the student may want to do an obscure course in another school. So how does that school offer its time frame? Therefore, can we create avenues beyond time period and syllabus we take?
- 3. Uniformity of assessment (eg. Examinations, internal, external, etc) are very central and should be done away with. Courses should be more flexible and students should be able to learn different courses in different places of their choice.
- 4. A new classroom with autonomy will depend on faculty interactions and syllabus sharing. Rethinking the way courses are framed require radical ideas to design the syllabus.
- 5. Cross institutional faculty sharing should be encouraged as it will eliminate competition for admissions and students.

NEP, therefore empowers teachers and to be a good pedagogue, one has to be both a teacher and a learner at the same time and one should give up the disciplinary hierarchy.

Lastly, the implementation of NEP lies in changing content to process. The process of events on how to, where to and what we can envision.

Presentation 3:

The third presentation was made by Prof. Arya Mazumdar.

The speaker approached the NEP through two lenses:

- 1. From the point of view of a lawyer/ law teacher
- 2. From the point of view of an administrator

While analyzing the NEP from the policy/ legal perspective, the speaker offered a couple of suggestions:

- 1. It may not be possible to implement the NEP in its entirety. From past experiences, we have learnt that India is a land of wonderful laws but with very poor implementation. Therefore there should be an acceptable middle ground that we can seek to achieve.
- 2. The major changes that the NEP is suggesting such as multidisciplinarity, experiential learning, etc. will take a considerable amount of time. The current policy has been 35 years in the making and therefore the government will not come up with anything new in the next 30 odd years' time. Therefore, the NEP will take some time to be implemented- if not in its entirety but in its majority.

The speaker also raised some valid points on what the NEP suggests but doesn't clearly spell out:

- 1. Many of the Liberal Arts Programmes offered in top universities in India are built on the Harvard model. Therefore, the approach may not be conducive to understanding the problems of rural India. Therefore, we should rethink our focus on the Liberal Arts Programme. Teaching is no longer about information exchange. It is about learning how to learn. Therefore, the focus should be on the process of learning.
- 2. Knowledge is no longer power but the skill of knowing what to do with the knowledge is the power. It is not only important for us to understand whatever text we are teaching our students, it is more important for the students to understand how to read such texts and how to grapple with complex philosophical questions. Therefore, it falls upon us as NEP ready educators to focus on our students developing the skills to apply whatever they want to learn in the outside world.
- 3. Multidisciplinary studies is essentially a problem of space and time. We have to undertake and open our minds to sharing our classrooms and our disciplines with others. Faculty sharing and sharing of classroom spaces and disciplines should be encouraged not only within a school/a college/a university but also between schools/colleges/universities. This can happen if we place our disciplines within a larger world view. Therefore one should focus on interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approach when it comes to academic planning.
- 4. Finally, of the 22 principles that NEP offers, the most important one is ethics. Ethics is not to be taught in isolation as a single course. By offering ethics as a single course is like creating pigeon holes/ reservation and ghettoizing the question of ethics. Therefore ethics should be introduced in the classrooms by bringing in questions that are difficult and questions that need to be tackled at some point of time. For example, when students are trapped in a situation, would they choose the difficult path or the easy path and which one is more ethical?

Presentation 4:

The fourth presentation was made by Dr. Suraj Gogoi.

The speaker gave his analysis of the NEP with an attitude of skepticism and sheds light on some of the issues that the policy is silent.

- 1. There are some very elemental aspects of education which are outside of the policy which are still not addressed nor recognised.
- 2. Lack of infrastructure and facilities will make it impossible to implement the NEP in true spirit.
- 3. Although the NEP stresses on the culture of research, Higher Educational Institutions in India lack the space and infrastructure for doing good research.

Conclusive remarks by the moderator:

While reminding the audience of an important quote which states as follows: "Ah! That a man's reach should exceed his grasp.. or what's the heaven for?" the moderator remarked that the idealism and utopian nature of the NEP is welcomed. Although it may seem that the NEP is beyond our reach, we should not dismiss it as something utopian, but we should raise the standards and do our best given the circumstances.

Finally, the moderator thanked the panelists for the insightful and interesting comments.

Keynote Speaker on the first day session was chaired by Prof. Apoorvanand, Delhi University opined that the NEP 2020 might fail due to lack of feedback from various stakeholder. The NEP 2020 according to him was implemented without looking in to the set-backs of various region in term of it availability of infrastructure and remoteness.

Day 2

Session 2 (10th November 2022)

Speaker: Prof. Creamlimon Nongbri (Professor, Education Department, NEHU Shillong)

The speech began with a greeting from the speaker to all participants present in the Webinar. The area in which the speaker Prof. Nongbri, spoke is on 'National Education Policy 2020 on North East India perspective'.

In her introductory speech Prof. Nongbri shares her view on the National Education policy 2020, that the policy was implemented without giving much time for consultation, discussion and feedback. Hence colleges in Meghalaya will have to face a lot of problem because of the lack of infrastructure and the human resource. The digital divide which exists in Meghalaya was heavily exposed during the pandemic because of poor network connectivity. Prof. Nongbri also spoke on the plight of the students in rural areas as these students "had to climb a tree on above the hill lock just to get signal on their network".

In the North Eastern Hill University (NEHU) a central university, Prof. Nongbri said that the university are compelled to implement the four-year integrated programme in UG course. However as of now only PG course was started with the new syllabus which is in line with the NEP 2020. A central university like NEHU also does not have a strong manpower to tackle the problems in implementing all the policies in North East India which is a concern for all.

The topic in which Prof. Nongbri presented is on Vocational Courses in Meghalaya: The challenges and way forward. The University Grants Commission (UGC) implemented the multidisciplinary programme to move towards a more holistic education. Vice chancellors of all universities have been asked to implement the policy. Through this new policy 55% of learners will have exposure in schools and higher learning. Identification of skill areas will be tap through different vocational course introduce in the curriculum. It is said that employment will now be generated as students will be equipped with many skills to undertake any job or task available to them. However, when we talk of employability it is still a concern in Meghalaya because of less industries. We know that skill education is necessary for economic growth of the economy, so educational institutions have to work with industries by signing MOUs to place students for skills course. The National Skills Development Initiative 2009 was started to empower all individuals through improved skills, knowledge and this initiative of the government is a good start up in towards realising the dream of a skill nation. The National Vocational Education Qualification Framework is also introduced to formally integrate vocational education with the mainstream education. Over all the NEP 2020 is a comprehensive policy which tries to revamp the vocational courses.

Prof. Nongbri also spoke of the challenges in Meghalaya. She said that challenges are two-fold and that is (i)organisation and implementation (ii) theories and practical. Till date there is no detail framework to spark the interest of the learner. Students who opt in vocational courses is still considered inferior in front of other formal mainstream courses; this kind of mindset has affected the students because for them only formal education is considered in society as a dignified field. Lack of infrastructure and manpower has affected the roll out of the policy. To answer all of these problems the NEP 2020 has integrated vocational courses within the syllabus. Now this has paved a way forward for the colleges to look for new initiatives and projects. To improve technical and vocational development we also have banks like the Asian Development Bank (ADB) which supports through their different interventions. The success for colleges will now depend on how much the government can support by upscaling financial support. In Meghalaya colleges will have to adopt a multi-pronged approach by conducting research based on primary and secondary data. And based on the results of their findings, colleges can consider it as an opportunity for their way forward. Colleges can look for skills course which are local oriented e.g., Tourism, agriculture, electrician, plumbing, mechanic, bee keeping, horticulture, floriculture, food processing etc. Colleges can tie up with different NGOs and other technical institutions like ITIs. Only multidisciplinary course will not have to be made mandatory. But one has to strictly keep in mind that while framing a final curriculum it has to ensure that there is enough credibility and objectivity also has to be maintained so that awarding of credits will be maintain with the highest standard of academic quality. In Meghalaya the government has recently come up with a new scheme to help colleges setup vocational course in their campuses and this has already been rolled out so that colleges can apply for this scheme. Thus, now it all depends upon all colleges to set the ball rolling for a new change in the education system.

Speaker: Prof. Piyush Roy.

The resource person first stressed that engagement in the classroom needs constant change.

He put forth a question on the validity of the policy and how it will affect the education system. He adds that the Policy puts education as a priority as it reexamines the education system of India as it puts in context the dynamic changes in learning as one has to think beyond the

traditional framework. He stressed on what the pandemic (Covid-19) did to society at a global level, that nothing stays the same.

The resource person reflects on his own career path as he moved from a journalist to a filmmaker and now a teacher which shows his own interest in people. He believes that the NEP will prepare students because it is more liberal in its approach to learning in comparison to the traditional approach to learning, by being more holistic, it gives students a range of options when it comes to career placement. The policy branches towards a multi-disciplinary space which would allow teachers to look beyond one discipline but rather how these disciplines 'converse' with one another. He ends his presentation by stating that the policy has refocused the process, delivery and discussion of education.

Speaker: Prof. V. Krishnappa

Prof. V. Krishnappa, takes a philosophically critical approach towards the NEP instead of seeing it as an ideal way of enhancing the education system in India. While the NEP seems like a good idea, there remains some issues which need to be clarified.

The structure of the NEP is such that it aims at extracting the most out of the best talents. But there is still the question about commitment to the students. The point being that it is unclear whether there will be significant benefits and in what manner.

There is also a change in the conceptual understanding of what higher education entails. Clarity on this issue is important. There is also the issue of whether the NEP could lead to situation where elitism becomes a problem in education.

On the pedagogical side, there is the issue of the kind of knowledge and knowhow that is required for the students which is in accordance with the present times. There is the need for enhancing the critical imagination of the students so that they can deal with the complexities and uncertainties related to the present society.

Keynote Speaker Reports

Profesor (Dr). Y. S. R Murthy V. C. R V University

The speaker address on the three aspects that needs to be addressed

- 1. Challenges
- 2. Regulatory Aspect
- 3. Practical Suggestions

He further expressed his experience working in the Jindal University for eleven years, he shared his prespective of Private State University. He visualizes the characteristics of an ideal University which consist of

- a. Academic and excellence in teaching learning process
- b. Full academic freedom
- c. Regulatory freedom
- d. Assured funding
- e. Capacity building and community engagement

 The NEP provides a roadmap, a great plan to help provide quality education to all.

 Under NEP setting up of new quality education and professional educational

institution have evolve into multi-disciplinary, merging of the institute in the same city is also allowed under NEP.

Despite the positive features of NEP there are several challenges and they include the following:

- i. Availability of adequate resources and participation of all stake holders with the government.
- ii. Funding challenges despite provisions made by the Government has not reach the education sector. The expenditure on education has not reach 6% of GDP
- iii. Opening of one university to meet the needs of education every week to meet its GROSS ENROLLMENT RATIO by 2025 as prescribe in NEP
- iv. Full institutional autonomy
- v. Policy, legislation and educational changes at all levels

A)Core of higher education system especially the private institutions

- i. The sustainability or revenue model is very important
- ii. Flexibility of students
- iii. 10% reservation for persons belonging to weaker section in education and public employment
- iv. Increasing access to the disadvantage groups in HEI

B) REGULATORY changes

NEW HIGHER EDUCATION COMMISION OF INDIA which was mention in NEP consist of 4 vertical dealings with grants, accreditation, regulate.

The role of a regulator should be of an enabler and the mindset of Private educational Institution is more of a revenue generation rather than education .some regulation have damaged rather than improving the university growth.

The process of starting an Institution should not be complex .There is no need to separately identify the Private and Government institution in regard to finding research extensions.

STATE PRIVATE UNIVERSITY ACT needs to be amended in the light of NEP with their tight regulation and state university should not be differentiate with the government university and norms should be removed and made uniform and requires changes to implement NEP.

Introduction:





He is also the MD & CEO of Gratia Technology Private Limited. He is currently pursuing his Global Doctorate Degree in Cyber Security from Swiss School of Business Management in Geneva, Switzerland. Biju Pegu, a leading certified cyber security analyst from Northeastern region has been relentlessly working to spread cyber security awareness in the country by addressing workshops at top educational institutions including different IITs, NITs, schools, universities, corporates like ONGC and others and have trained more than 1 lakhs students and public about cyber security. Biju Pegu has been honoured with Cyber Security Crusader of the Year 2020 Award for spreading cyber security awareness across the country. The award was presented to Mr. Pegu by Union Minister of State for Steel and Rural Development Fagan Singh Kulaste and former Rajya Sabha MP Jayaprada. Mr. Biju Pegu has also been awarded the "Entrepreneur of the Year - IT Innovation" by Shri Ramdas Athawale, Hon'ble Minister of State for Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India and many more. Mr. Pegu also worked at IIT Guwahati for around11 years on different speech related projects.

In the programme, the resource person talks about hackers, viruses and people who would intrude in the system and mobile phones. The programme is an interactive one. Mr. Pegu gives a live demonstration on how hackers hack the mobile phone through phony website of social media such as facebook and instagram. In the demonstration students were ask to volunteer and real time hacking were shown on the screen of how hackers assess the passwords and details of users. They were also taught how to prevent themselves from hackers while using mobile phone.
